Together with our partners we have therefore vigorously continued the campaigns begun in 2013 to ensure that the legislation, when it finally reaches the statute book, will provide a sound framework to protect what we all hold so dear in our landscapes and cultural heritage, whilst maximising the many benefits we all draw from them, through the sensitive sustainable development of our rural communities.

Lest it be thought that all was doom and gloom, I wish to highlight several pleasing developments during the year. I am particularly pleased that during the year the Montgomeryshire Branch was relaunched and has made a flying start. Whilst we still have some work to do in a couple of areas of Wales to revitalise local activities there,

our Branches have continued with undiminished enthusiasm to monitor and comment on local developments. I was also very encouraged by the readiness of active Branch members to participate and help the Trustees in developing a concerted campaign to increase our membership. This will form a major part of our activities in the coming year. Linked to that, our newly designed website was launched during the year and has been generally well received. The new design gives clearer prominence to our campaigns, with links to our various policy documents and campaign literature, as well as useful guidance on planning and related matters. It also provides each Branch with a page on which to post their local news. This will help Branches to attract new members and raise public awareness by demonstrating the value of our work and the opportunity that membership of CPRW gives people to take an active role in protecting and enhancing their environment and their community.

Neges y Cadeirydd

Mae'n amlwg o'r adroddiad blynyddol yma bod yr argymhellion deddfwriaethol sy'n cael eu dilyn gan Lywodraeth Cymru yn dal i fygwth dyfodol hir dymor ein tirweddau drwy wrthod cydnabod eu rôl ganolig a'u gwerth cynhenid mewn diogelu ein hamgylchedd a gwella ansawdd bywyd ein pobl. Drwy gyd-weithio â'n partneriaid rydym wedi dal ati ers 2013 i ymgyrchu'n galed i wneud yn siwr fod y ddeddfwriaeth, pan fydd yn cyrraedd y llyfr statudol, yn darparu fframwaith cadarn er diogelu yr hyn yr ydym i gyd yn ei gyfrif mor annwyl sef ein tirweddau, a'n etifeddiaeth diwylliannol tra'n magsimeiddio'r buddiannau lluosog sy'n deillio ohonynt, gan ddatblygu ein cymunedau gwledig mewn modd cynaladwy a sensitif.

Rhag ofn i chi feddwl bod popeth yn edrych yn ddu, hoffwn dynnu eich sylw at nifer o ddatblygiadau boddhaol yn ystod y flwyddyn. Rwyf yn hynod o falch fod Cangen Sir Drefaldwyn wedi cael ei ail-lawnsio ac wedi cychwyn ar garlam. Er bod ganddom waith i'w wneud mewn rhai ardaloedd o Gymru i ailegino gweithgareddau ynddynt, mae ein canghennau wedi gweithio gyda

brwdfrydedd ac egni yn monitro ac estyn sylw ar ddatblygiadau lleol. Roeddwn hefyd wedi fy nghalonogi gan barodrwydd aelodau gweithgar y canghennau i gymeryd rhan a chynorthwyo'r Ymddiriedolwyr yn yr ymgyrch i gynyddu nifer yr aelodaeth. Bydd hyn yn ffurfio rhan sylweddol o'n gwaith yn ystod y flwyddyn sydd i ddod. Yn gysylltiedig â hynny, fe ail-lawnsiwyd ein gwefan yn ystod y flwyddyn, datblygiad sydd wedi cael ei groesawu. Mae'r dyluniad newydd yn rhoi lle amlycach i'n hymgyrchoedd, gyda linciau i'n dogfennau polisi a llenyddiaeth ymgyrchu, yn ogystal a chanllawiau defnyddiol ar faterion cynllunio a materion perthnasol. Mae hefyd yn rhoi tudalen i'n canghennau rannu eu newyddion lleol. Bydd hyn o gymorth i'r canghennau i ddenu aelodau newydd ac i godi ymwybyddiaeth y cyhoedd drwy ddangos gwerth ein gwaith a'r cyfle mae YDCW yn ei roi i bobl i gymeryd rhan weithgar mewn diogelu a chodi gwerth eu hamgylchedd lleol a'u cymunedau.

2014 has seen the significance of landscapes as a strategic policy theme weaken and diminish in the eyes of Welsh Government. It has been a year when their perspectives of how landscapes fit into the emerging agenda for natural resources management has become even more unclear. This was highlighted to the extent that even the status and role of Wales' iconic landscape areas, its National Parks and AONBs, has been brought into question. Worryingly our landscapes now seem to be simply viewed as commodities to be used to provide little more than increased economic opportunities and to satisfy public needs.

Given these circumstances, our efforts during 2014 have again been focused on maintaining and promoting the credibility of Wales' landscapes and seascapes as both national assets and places which provide a wide range of benefits, when they are managed sensitively and responsibly.

In 2014 we therefore had to work harder than ever with fewer resources to convince decision makers of the importance and the huge contribution that the landscapes of Wales make not just to the nation's identity but also to everyone's sense of place and quality of life. Our activities as highlighted in this Annual report demonstrate how our efforts, though wide-ranging have been focused on this key issue. Hopefully the rewards from them will be seen in the various aspects of new legislation which will be emerging from Cardiff Bay during 2015.

The determination of our very scarce but dedicated staff resources in Head Office have been pivotal to these efforts. Working

as a small team, CPRW has maintained its credibility as an organisation which is well respected and one which contributes positively to both the national arenas and important policy debates.

In addition to our national efforts, our local Branches have been equally active and effective in responding to the growing number of development pressures affecting their respective areas of rural Wales.

During the year for instance, we have continued to dedicate a significant amount of time and effort nationally and locally to respond to a plethora of Welsh Government consultations, all part of the increasing complex and seemingly disjointed agenda of proposed legislative reform the Welsh Government is pursuing. Continued contact with AMs supportive of our messages and with key Welsh Government officials has proved hugely beneficial and provided the necessary platform to voice and gain political support for our work.

CPRW continues to act as the Secretariat for the AMs Cross Party Rural Affairs Group organising and hosting four highly successful meetings of this influential Group. This Forum has not only provided an important means of sharing information on current rural issues and the opportunity to influence a range of AMs and their officials but has also helped raise the profile and credibility of our work. The success of this Group is due in the main to the efforts of Cat Griffith-Williams, our Head of Public Affairs, to whom we record our thanks. Without this Forum it would certainly be more difficult for CPRW to make a meaningful input into the current range of strategic issues being

pursued by Welsh Government which affect the future of rural Wales.

The continued bedding in of Natural Resources Wales has also not been without its challenges for us, as the new organisation seems far less receptive to promoting the concepts of landscape and their responsible stewardship, than its predecessors, the Countryside Council for Wales. CPRW along with a number of other environmental organisations remain concerned, and continue to struggle to convince NRW to fulfil all its responsibilities to protect the environment of Wales. This challenge is now made all the more difficult by virtue of the fact that NRW decided at the end of 2014, not to renew CPRW's long-standing programme of grant funding as from April 2015. We were particularly disappointed that the organisation's first Corporate Plan, published in the early Summer, does not include the protection of Wales' landscapes as one of its key priorities over the next five year period.

It is therefore ironic that having won greater Cross party political support for our work and messages in the Assembly, we now find that the organisation responsible for the delivery of Wales' landscape agenda is seemingly showing little direct interest in this area of work.

In an attempt to reverse this situation, we have worked closely with the newly formed Alliance for National Parks Cymru, to highlight at least the role and value of Wales' iconic protected landscapes, its three National Parks and five AONBs, in delivering public well-being. The event we organised in Cardiff Bay in June, provided the opportunity not only to launch

this new organisation but also to highlight the role that landscapes can play in promoting and delivering public well-being. Since then CPRW as part of this Alliance has worked determinedly to ensure that the interest of Protected landscapes are fully and properly accounted for in all the four pieces of legislation which are at different stages of their passage through the legislative process. CPRW has in a number of instances taken the lead in promoting these interests on behalf of the Alliance.¹

Of particular relevance in this respect is the high profile role the Alliance has taken in the ongoing "Review of Designated Landscapes in Wales", and in particular the desire to support the National Park Authorities in their efforts to retain their planning powers and status as independent Planning Authorities.

We anticipate this work to ensure that the legislation takes full account of the importance of the landscapes of Wales and its rural communities; this work must continue and indeed intensify in 2015. During this period we expect our work to focus on ensuring that landscape interests are accounted for, if not directly then indirectly, in not only the Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Bill, but also featuring prominently in the Environment, Planning and Heritage Bills, all of which continue to evolve at considerable speed and in a seemingly disjointed manner.

As mentioned previously, CPRW efforts in 2014 were not restricted solely to influencing the national agenda. Much has happened in those Branches which are active, thanks to the continued commitment shown by all those members, who actively engage in local issues.

Examples of the sterling efforts of our Branches are reflected by the fact that

● **The Montgomeryshire Branch** has been revitalised thanks to the resolute efforts of a small group of dedicated members in that branch. Since its re launch in September the Branch has gone from strength to strength and has already established an active programme of events and increased its membership. Particular thanks are therefore expressed and recorded to the small group of Committee members under the Chairmanship of Chris Fuller for reversing the fortunes of the Branch, in a part of Wales which is suffering more than its fair share of unacceptable landscape threats at the moment.

● **Our Caernarfonshire Branch** organised in November yet another in its series of successful annual professional day seminars, this year its theme focusing on the scope for, and issues associated with, the promotion of small scale community based renewable energy initiatives. The Branch also continues to champion the need for greater protection of the landscapes from the spread of single wind turbines in their area and across North Wales as a whole. Information the Branch produced on the spread of single turbines has not only helped influence local planning guidance on this important issue, but has also been instrumental in providing a sound evidence base for the publication of a CPRW position paper on this issue.

● In the south, the **Brecon and Radnor Branch**, having been reorganised comparatively recently, also continues to grow in strength and champion our interests in the Brecon Beacons National Park and the adjacent areas of Powys. Their efforts are to be particularly applauded given the sad loss of their stalwart Chairperson Meriel Oliver late in the year.

All those involved in these Branch efforts, and the many others in other active Branches, are being thanked for their role in contributing to CPRW's collective efforts and for organising the many successful local Branch events which now take place across Wales. Likewise the dedication and energy of our Branches in challenging the threats to the landscapes and communities in their respective areas is second to none. Their vigilance and collective determination continues to make a real difference and ensure that CPRW remains one of Wales' most respected countryside watchdogs. Our sincere gratitude is extended to those who give so much of their time to issues of local concern. Despite these successes, the number of Branches still effectively dormant remains of concern.

A number of other significant and high profile issues also dominated our work during the year, none more so than the Public Inquiry into the proposals to build five major wind farm proposals in Mid Wales. In response to the appeal launched for CPRW to fund a landscape consultant to produce the necessary evidence to help the "Mid Wales Alliance" of local volunteer campaigning groups fight these proposals, an amazing total of £15,000 was raised by CPRW. With additional support from "Montgomery against Pylons", over £30,000 was therefore available to produce the necessary evidence to submit to the landmark Public Inquiry. By the end of 2014, whilst the Inquiry had been completed and the inspector's report submitted to the Secretary of State for Climate Change and Energy, his decision as to the acceptability of these proposals, still had not been announced.

¹ The Alliance for National Parks Cymru is a Partnership network with representatives of the three National Park Societies, the Association of Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty and CPRW working collectively to further the interests of National Protected Landscapes in Wales.

Yn ystod 2014 gwelwyd pwysigrwydd y tirwedd fel thema polisi strategol yn gwanychu a lleihau yng ngolwg Llywodraeth Cymru. Roedd yn flyyddyn ple roedd eu syniadaeth am sut mae tirweddau yn ffitio i'w ffeithio i'w agendau cyffredinol am adnoddau naturiol yn fwy aegnlur. Amlygwyd hyn yn y modd y daeth statws a rôl tirweddau mwyaf eiconic Cymru, ein Parciau Cenedlaethol ac Ardaloedd o Brydferthwch Naturiol Eithriadol dan y chwyddwydr. Mae'n peri cryn pryder fod ein tirweddau bellach yn cael eu gweld fel nwyddau i ddarparu dim mwy nag ychydig o gyfleon economaidd ac fel manau i ddigoni anghenion y cyhoedd.

O gofio'r amgylchiadau hyn, bu ein hymdrechion yn ystod 2014 yn canolbwyntio yn bennaf ar gynnal a hyrwyddo lle tirweddau a morluniau Cymru fel asedau cenedlaethol ac fel manau sy'n darparu ystod eang o fuddion, pan y gant eu rheoli'n gyfrifol a sensitif.

Yn 2014 felly, bu'n rhaid i ni weithio'n galetach nag erioed gyda llai o adnoddau i ddarbwyllio y rhai sy'n gwneud penderfyniadau o bwysigrwydd a chyfraniad anferthol tirweddau Cymru nid yn unig yn hunaniaeth Cymru ond hefyd i ansawdd bywyd ei phobl a'u nawws am le. Mae ein gweithgareddau er y eangfyrdig, fel ac y gwelir yn yr Adroddiad Blynyddol hwn wedi canolbwyntio ar y materion allweddol hyn. Gobeithio y bydd ein hymdrechion yn cael eu gwobrwyo gan ddeddfwriaeth newydd o Fae Caerdydd yn ystod 2015.

Mae penderfyniad ein ychydig staff ymroddedig yn ein Prif Swyddfa wedi bod yn allweddol yn ein hymdrechion. Gan weithio fel tim bychan, mae YDCW wedi cynnal ein hygrededd fel mudiad sy'n cael ei barchu ac un sy'n cyfannu'n bositif i ddatleuon polisi ar lefel lleol a chenedlaethol.

Yn ogystal a'n hymdrechion cenedlaethol, mae ein canghennau lleol wedi bod yr un mor effeithiol a gweithgar ac arfer yn eu hymateb i'r nifer cynyddol o ddatblygiadau sy'n rhoi pwysau ar wahanol ardaloedd o Gymru wledig.

Yn ystod y flwyddyn, er enghraifft rydym wedi dal ati i fuddsoddi amser ac ymdrech helaeth yn genedlaethol a lleol i ymateb i nifer o ymgynghoriadau gan Lywodraeth Cymru, i gyd yn rhan o agenda o ddiwygiadau deddfwriaethol ac ymddangos yn gymleth a digyswllt. Mae cynwllt parhaol gyda Aelodau Cynulliad sy'n gefnogol i'n negeseuon wedi profi'n fuddiol iawn gan ddarparu llwyfan i leisio ein barn a chynyddu'r gefnogaeth wleidyddol i'n gwaith.

Daliodd YDCW ati yn 2014 i wneud gwaith gweinyddol i'r Grŵp Materion Gwledig Traws Bleidiol o Aelodau Cynulliad gan drefnu a gweinyddu pedwar cyfarfod pwysig o'r grŵp dylanwadol hwn. Mae'r Fforwm nid yn unig wedi darparu dull pwysig o rannu gwybodaeth ar faterion gwledig cyfredol a chyfle i ddylanwadu ar Aelodau Cynulliad a'u swyddogion ond hefyd wedi helpu i godi ein profill a hygredd ein gwaith. Mae llwyddiant

y Grŵp hwn yn bennaf oherwydd ymdrechion ein Pennaeth Materion Cyhoeddus sef Cat Griffith-Williams ac estynnwn ein diolch iddi. Heb y Fforwm hwn byddai yn bendant yn anoddach i YDCW i roi mewnbyn pwrpasol ar faterion strategol cyfredol Llywodraeth Cymru sy'n effeithio ar ddyfodol Cymru wledig.

Mae'r broses o sefydlu Cyfoeth Naturiol Cymru wedi profi'n sialens i ni, gan fod y corff newydd yn dipyn llai parod i dderbyn y cysyniad o dirweddau a'u stiwardiaeth cyfrifol na'i ragflaenydd Cynog Cefn Gwlad Cymru. Mae YDCW ynghyd â nifer o fudiadau amgylcheddol eraill yn parhau i bryderu ac yn dal ati i geisio darbwyllo CNC i gyflawni ei dyletswyddau o ddiogelu amgylchedd Cymru. Mae'r sialens hwn yn anoddach fyth gan fod CNC wedi penderfynu ddiwedd 2014 i beidio adnewyddu y grant i YDCW o Ebrill 2015 ymlaen. Roeddem yn siomedig iawn o weld yng Nghynllun Corfforaethol cyntaf y corff newydd a gyhoeddwyd ddechrau'r haf nad ydi amddiffyn tirweddau Cymru yn un o flaenoriaethau allweddol CNC yn ystod y pum mlynedd nesaf.

Mae felly yn eirionig ein bod yn ennill mwy a mwy o gefnogaeth gwleidyddol traws bleidiol yn y Cynulliad i'n gwaith a'n negeseuon, tra bod y corff sy'n gyfrifol am weithredu'r agenda i dirweddau Cymru, yn ymddangos fel petai ag ychydig iawn o ddiddordeb yn y maes hwn o waith.

Mewn ymdrech i wiroi'r sefyllfa, rydym wedi gweithio'n agos gyda mudiad newydd 'Y Gynghrair dros Parciau Cenedlaethol Cymru er mwyn tynnu sylw at werth a rôl ein tirweddau gwarchoddedig eiconic, y tri Parc Cenedlaethol a'r pump Ardal o Harddwch Naturiol Eithriadol mewn gwarchod tirweddau a chyfrannu at les ein pobl. Bu'r digwyddiad a drefnom ym Mae Caerdydd yn Mehefin, yn gyfle nid yn unig i lawnsio'r mudiad newydd ond hefyd i dynnu sylw at rôl tirweddau fel manau sy'n effeithio ar fuddiannau cyhoeddus. Mae YDCW ers hynny wedi bod fel aelod o'r Gynghrair yn gweithio'n ddygn i sicrhau bod buddiannau Ardaloedd Gwarchoddedig yn cael sylw ddiys yn y pedwar darn o ddeddfwriaeth sydd ar hyn o bryd yn symud drwy'r broses ddeddfu. Mae YDCW mewn nifer o achosion wedi arwain y ffordd drwy hyrwyddo'r diddordebau hyn ar ran y Gynghrair.¹

O berthnasedd arbennig bu rôl profill uchel y Gynghrair yn yr "Adolygiad o Dirweddau Dynodedig yng Nghymru" ac yn enwedig ein awydd i gefnogi Awdurdodau'r Parciau Cenedlaethol yn eu hymdrech i gadw pŵerau cynllunio fel Awdurdodau Cynllunio Annibynnol.

Rydym yn rhagweld y bydd y gwaith hwn o sicrhau bod y ddeddfwriaeth yn tynnu sylw at werth ein tirweddau a'n cymunedau gwledig yn parhau a dwyschau yn 2015. Yn ystod y cyfnod hwn rydym yn rhagweld y bydd rhan helaeth o'n gwaith yn ymwneud â sicrhau bod tirweddau yn cael lle amlwg yn uniongyrchol ac anuniongyrchol yn y Mesur Lles Cenedlaethau'r Dyfodol (Cymru), a hefyd yn cael lle amlwg yn y

Mesurau Amgylchedd, Cynllunio a Threftadaeth, mesurau sy'n esblygu'n gyflym a digyswllt.

Fel ac y creblyllwyd eisoes roedd ymdrechion YDCW yn 2014 ddim wedi ei gyfyngu i ddylanwadu ar cenedlaethol yn unig. Mae llawer wedi digwydd yn y Canghennau gweithredol, drwy ymroddiad yr aelodau sy'n ymroi i faterion lleol:

Mae esiamplau o ymdrechion clodwiw ein Canghennau yn cael eu hadlewyrchu yn y ffaith bod:

● **Cangen Sir Drefaldwyn** wedi ailsefydlu oherwydd ymdrech penderfynol grŵp bychan o aelodau ymroddedig. Ers ei ail sefydlu fis Medi mae'r gangen wedi mynd o nerth i nerth ac eisoes wedi sefydlu rhaglen o weithgareddau i gynyddu nifer yr aelodaeth. Mae angen rhoi diolch neilltuol i aelodau'r pwyllgor dan Gadeiryddiaeth Chris Fuller am aillegio'r Gangen mewn ardal o Gymru sydd wedi dioddef mwy na'u cyfran deg o fygythiadau annerbyniol i'r tirweddau o fewn yr ardal.

● **Cangen Sir Gaernarfon** wedi trefnu yn mis Tachwedd cyfres lwyddiannus eto o seminarau proffesiynol, yn canolbwyntio ar gyfleon sy'n deillio o fentrau ynni adnewyddol cymunedol bach eu maint. Bu'r Gangen yn dal ati ar flaen yr ymgyrch yn erbyn ymlediad turbiniau gwynt unigol yn eu hardal ac ar hyd Gogledd Cymru. Bu gwybodaeth a gynhyrchwyd gan y Gangen ar y mater nid yn unig o gyfarwyddyd i ddylanwadu ar gynllunio lleol ond hefyd yn gyfraniad pwysig i gyhoeddiad YDCW ar dyrbinau gwynt unigol.

● Yn y de yn eithaf diweddar bu proses o aildefnu **Cangen Brycheiniog a Maesyfed** gyda'r gangen yn dal i dyfu mewn nerth a dylanwad gan sefyll dros ein diddordebau yn Mharc Cenedlaethol Bannau Brycheiniog ac ardaloedd cyfagos ym Mhowys. Mae eu hymdrechion yn haeddu clod yn enwedig o gofio'r newydd trist ddiwedd y flwyddyn am farwolaeth eu Gadeirydd cydnerth Meriel Oliver.

Mae'r rhai sydd wedi bod yn ymwneud â'r ymdrechion hyn a llawer o rai eraill mewn canghennau gweithgar eraill i'w llongyfarch am y rol pwysig y maent yn ei gyfrannu at ymdrech cyfunol YDCW ac am ddiwyddiadau llwyddiannus lleol sydd bellach yn digwydd ledled Cymru. Yn ogystal, mae ymroddiad ac egni ein Canghennau lleol yn herio'r bygythiadau sy'n wynebu'n tirweddau a'n cymunedau yn haeddu canmoliaeth. Mae eu gofal a penderfyniad cyfunol yn gwneud gwir wahaniaeth ac yn sicrhau bod YDCW yn parhau'n un o fudiadau gwarchod cefn gwlad uchaf ei pharch. Mae ein diolch diddwyll yn cael ei ymestyn i'r rheini sy'n rhoi cymaint o'u hamser ac egni i faterion o bwysigrwydd lleol. Er y llwyddiannau hyn, mae'r nifer o ganghennau sy'n anweithredol yn parhau'n bryder.

CPRW again takes this opportunity to recognise and express thanks for the tireless efforts, commitment and professionalism of the many local people in Montgomeryshire and Northern Radnorshire who joined forces and public spoke up at the Inquiry against these massive and totally unacceptable intrusions into the landscapes of mid Wales. We record our debt of gratitude to all those who fought to protect the upland landscapes of these unspoilt areas.

Throughout the year, we also continued to work with many like-minded partners who share the common aim of protecting Welsh landscapes and community life in rural Wales. The Director continued his involvement with Wales Environment Link (WEL) but due to the pressure of internal work and commitments stepped down from his role as a Trustee. He continued however to represent CPRW's interests in the activities of the Brecon Beacons Trust in his capacity as its Chairman. Due to the lack of resources and increasing activities of the Alliance for National Parks Cymru, CPRW has not been able to maintain the momentum of the Wales Landscape Partnership, and therefore the work of this network of professionals has been curtailed at least in the short term.

Bu nifer o faterion sylweddol a phroffil uchel yn dominyddu ein gwaith yn ystod y flwyddyn yn enwedig yr Ymchwiliad Cyhoeddus i'r cynllun i adeiladu pump fferm wynt fawr yng Nganolbarth Cymru. Codwyd swm anhygoel o £15,000 mewn ymateb i'r apel a lawnsiwyd gan YDCW i gyflogi Ymgynghorydd Tirwedd i gynhyrchu'r dystiolaeth angenrheidiol i helpu "Cynghrair Canolbarth Cymru" o grwpiau ymgyrchu lleol i ymladd yn erbyn y cynlluniau. Mae YDCW yn cydnabod, ac am gymeryd y cyfle hwn i ddiolch, i gynifer o bobl lleol yn Sir Drefaldwyn a Gogledd Maesyfed am eu hymdrechion diflino, eu hymroddiad a'u proffesiynoldeb yn ymuno fel un gan siarad yn gyhoeddus yn yr Ymchwiliad yn erbyn yr ymyrraeth hollol annerbyniol hwn i dirwedd Canolbarth Cymru. Rydym yn cofnodi ein diolchgarwch i bawb a frwydrodd i ddiogelu dirweddau'r ucheldiroedd dilychwyn hyn.

All the activities at this national level have collectively extended the reach and impact of CPRW's work and were made possible thanks to the grant aid provided to CPRW as part of its three year Partnership programme with the Natural Resources Wales. As mentioned previously, due to a change in NRW's priorities, CPRW was informed at the end of the year that, disappointingly, this funding stream would no longer continue beyond the end of March 2015. The loss of this £20K grant aid will inevitably affect the range of work that CPRW will be able to undertake in 2015 and beyond, unless other sources of finances are secured in the short term to replace these funds which have been lost.

Along with the numerous responses submitted by Branches to local planning consultations, Head Office also submitted 10 substantive written responses, on behalf of the organisation, to Welsh Government consultations during the year. Statements of evidence were also submitted to the National Assembly for Wales's Environment and Sustainability Committee, as was evidence to the Welsh Government's Independent (Williams) Committee, the latter charged with reviewing the Governance and Delivery of Public Services in Wales. In addition CPRW submitted representation to the Review Panel charged with considering

Fel ac y soniwyd eisoes, oherwydd newid ym mlaenoriaethau CNC, fe hysbyswyd YDCW ddiwedd y flwyddyn y byddai'r ffynhonnell hon o gyllid yn dod i ben fis Mawrth 2015. Mae'r golled o £20K o gymorth grant yn anochel o gael effaith ar ystod gwaith YDCW yn ystod 2015 a thu hwnt, oni bai ein bod yn dod o hyd i ffynonellau ariannol newydd yn lle'r arian a gollwyd.

Throughout the year CPRW's views and messages also continued to feature regularly in the press and media. In addition CPRW web site was refreshed and re-launched in a bilingual format and copies of the successful Members Bulletin were produced every month

With continued support from Post Office (Wales), once more our local Branches showcased the best of rural Wales through our popular Rural Wales Award scheme. During 2014 five such Awards were presented to those whose efforts and imagination helped improve the quality and diversity of Wales's environment. We congratulate all of these individuals for their efforts in caring for rural Wales and making it a better place.

Our Chairman, Dr Jean Rosenfeld continued to work tirelessly to conscientiously create a bridge between the work of the National Executive Committee and that of all our Branches. We again thank him for the leadership and commitment he continues to show by example, to all aspects of CPRW's work.

The post of Hon Treasurer remained vacant in 2014 but members of the National Executive Committee, in conjunction with Head Office, continued to monitor the organisation's finances throughout the year.

As mentioned our efforts to raise additional funds focused on raising funds to support the costs of the Mid Wales Public Inquiry. The contributions made by members and non-members alike were remarkable. Our success with these fund-raising efforts did however have implications on other efforts to raise other funds to support other core activities.

2014 also saw the start of a determined campaign led by the NEC and the Branches to recruit new members to CPRW. Led by active groups in both the South and North, a variety of initiatives are now being formulated and are emerging to increase what were previously dwindling membership numbers and hence income for the organisation. The wider implementation of this recruitment drive will most certainly be a significant aspect of the organisation's work at both Branch and national level during 2015.

As mentioned, 2014 was also year which saw the sad passing of the former Chair of the Brecon and Radnorshire Branch, Meriel Oliver. Her contribution to CPRW's work locally was tireless and we record our sincerest gratitude to her for these endeavours.

We have also continued the established pattern of two of the four Council meetings during the year being held in the regions of Wales, one in the south in April, the other in the north in November, thereby providing opportunities for all CPRW members to attend.

Financial circumstances throughout the year meant that there was little scope to increase the permanent staff complement at Head Office. Despite the enormous range of work being undertaken, the staff complement still remains at the equivalent of 2.5 full time staff.

During 2014, three editions of our highly respected Rural Wales magazine were published. If it were not for the financial support provided by the Natural Resources Wales, the publication of these influential magazines would not have been possible. We thank National Resources Wales for their continued support for our work in this respect.

In addition, our popular and informative monthly Members' eBulletin was again produced every month throughout 2014, thereby providing our members with an effective and much welcomed means of keeping up to date with our work and the range of current issues affecting rural Wales. This service will continue in 2015. Work on refreshing CPRW's web site in a bilingual format was also completed and launched early in 2014.

In addition a significant investment of time and resources was directed towards continuing to upgrade and quality-assure the information held in our organisation's membership data base. As a result of the efforts of Carys Matthews, our

The outcomes of our efforts during the year have therefore successfully fulfilled our Charitable Objects and achieved the associated public benefits which the Charity seeks to achieve by

● **Raising public and political awareness of the relevance of the European Landscape Convention in Wales, and the national and local value that all Welsh landscapes and seascapes provide to the social and economic and personal wellbeing of the Welsh public.**

● **Ensuring the role and relevance of landscapes and the needs of rural communities feature prominently in the legislative thinking, strategic policies and the actions of the Welsh Government and other decision makers.**

● **Encouraging a positive behavioural change by the public to improve equality, social and environmental justice.**

● **Showcasing CPRW as a trademark organisation which works to high standards and acts to protect and promote sound and responsible landscape and seascape stewardship policies and practices.**

Our Finances

Financially, 2014 was a year of mixed fortunes. A slight reduction in some aspects of our income was balanced by the receipt of the residue of a significant legacy partly received in 2013. Despite this and in anticipation of cash flow problems in the first two quarters of 2015 and a reduction in grant aid from NRW, the NEC resolved to draw down a significant amount of the funds (£50,000) from our Reserves at the end of the year. **It is for this reason that the out turn figures at the year-end appear so healthy.** Notwithstanding this, the continued tight management of the organisation's funds has continued and enabled the working balances to be kept as low as possible.

The ability to draw down heavily from our Reserves was in no small part thanks to continued prudent management of our Reserve funds by our financial advisors, Investec. Following the withdrawal of the £50,000 from our Reserves at the end of the year, the value of these funds had dropped from £187,194 at the beginning of 2014 to £135,805 by the year end. As ever, we acknowledge the continued efforts and diligence of our Holding Trustees in overseeing the management of these Reserve funds.

We also record our gratitude and sincere thanks to Robin Herbert, one of our longest standing

Holding Trustees, who stepped down from this role after fulfilling this important role for over 10 years.

As is standard practice with our Accounts, the assets held by all our Branches are recognised and included in this financial statement as part of the organisation's overall funds.

Throughout the year, stringent efforts were made to control expenditure whilst also making continued efforts to find new sources of additional income to help increase the total value of our unrestricted funds. Income from members remained steady and generated a total of £22,871 compared to the £15,661 in 2013. Income from Trusts and Foundations was £12,537, from donations £12,041 and legacies £15,983.

Those windfall legacies and donations received during 2014 significantly helped our cash flow circumstances and avoided what would otherwise have been a much greater potential end of year income shortfall. Our continuing dependency on legacies continues to remain a significant concern and the principal risk to the organisation's financial security in both the short and the longer term.

Fundraising to support CPRW's core activities was weak during 2014, but this must be viewed in the context of the amounts that were raised to support the Mid Wales Public Inquiry. In total only £63,432 was raised as unrestricted income

to support our overall Charitable objects. The total amount spent on achieving our Charitable objectives of the organisation in 2014 was therefore £183,410.

In an attempt to improve our financial efficiency we also introduced a combination of Direct Debit payment scheme for the payment of membership subscriptions and an on-line means of payments and donations to the organisation through the refreshed web site. This successful change has proven itself to be both more efficient and cost effective and less demanding from an administrative point of view.

Thanks to grant aid from Natural Resources Wales, we successfully completed the third and final year of our three year Partnership programme of work with the organisation. The loss of these funds will be greatly missed.

As ever, support for our work is funded principally through the generosity of our members in the form of their subscriptions and the donations they provide. However, without the legacies we receive we would certainly not be able to function as effectively as we do. We again thank all those who supported CPRW in 2014.

Finally, we thank the continuing efforts of our Resources Officer, Carys Matthews, for her professional day-to-day management of our accounts and the administration of our Head Offices in Welshpool.
